Striving Forward and Looking Ahead

As Chairman of the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation (NCMPEF), I am pleased to say that we had a banner year. In keeping with our vision to be the PREMIER philanthropic leader in the City of Chesapeake and the Hampton Roads area, we endeavor to improve the quality of life in the community through education. We are "striving forward and looking ahead" to achieving this vision through supplementing educational programs, supplementing educational services, providing scholarships, and facilitating mentoring.

First and foremost, I wish to thank all of our corporate sponsors and individual donors for their financial support and well wishes. A number of our corporate donors and individual donors increased their financial support by becoming gold and platinum level sponsors for our signature breakfast and gala events. Also, I am pleased to announce that after fourteen years of existence, Chesapeake Public Schools has announced NCMPEF a "Partner in Education". In August of this year, we formally thanked all of our premier supporters and donors through our first annual Awards reception held at the Chesapeake Conference Center. We recognized donors as well as two scholarship recipients.

As a direct result of the increase in financial donations, NCMPEF will increase ALL scholarships to one thousand dollars! All twenty-one African-American male achievement scholarships in addition to the Arts/Trade, William Ward Family, HBCU scholarship, NCMPEF/Chesapeake Education Association Educator Scholarship, and the newly added McDermott Trade scholarship will ALL be valued at one thousand dollars. Also, all five back to school supply donation sites (three Title I schools, Chesapeake Juvenile Services and Chesapeake Center for Student Success) will receive five hundred dollars each.

After experiencing the effects of the pandemic, NCMPEF will hold monthly meetings face to face again at the Buffalow Family and Friends Multipurpose Center located in South Norfolk. In addition, in order to ensure stability among the Board during the pandemic, the current Board

remained intact. An election will be successfully conducted on Friday, December 2, 2022 with the installation of new officers thereafter.

In closing, in order to "strive forward and look ahead", NCMPEF will work on fostering a partnership with the Chesapeake Housing and Redevelopment Association (CHRA). We are in the process of creating a mentoring program with the CHRA in conjunction with a scholarship opportunity. This will supplement the opportunities and partnerships that we have formed with Ground Zero Youth Development Inc., the Chesapeake Division of the Boys and Girls Club, and others.

The 14th Annual Black Male Achievement and Scholarship Breakfast

The 14th Annual Black Male Achievement and Scholarship Breakfast Program was held April 30, 2022 in the Chesapeake Conference Center, and was attended by 520 people. The keynote speaker, Attorney, Carlos M. Brown, senior vice president, general counsel and chief compliance officer, Dominion Energy, was not able to attend, and his speech was delivered via zoom video. Carlos presented a three point inspiring speech on his development as a person that he conveyed to the awardees, other youth and adults. He noted that he also was a recipient of a W.P. Clark Scholarship which helped him with acquiring his education. He indicated to the students (1) keep running, (2) set goals, and (3) find a dreamer role model. He admonished the students to run from the negative stereotypes that depicts young Blacks as thugs, uneducated, marijuana smoking, and lazy. He encouraged them to run toward high achievement, and develop oneself to be a change agent in the World. Secondly, Carlos encourage them to set ambitious goals, and guard against becoming complacent. He emphasized that the real tragedy in one life is to have no goals. Finally, he encouraged the students to find a "dreamer role model." He noted that it was important to find successful role models to pattern your life after to give you guidance and directions in life.



NCMPEF Impact on the Community

- 1. Honored 273 students and provided \$172,000.00 in scholarship awards.
- 2. Provided \$6,000.00 in support of the Chesapeake Unit, Boys and Girl Club Steak and Burger Dinner (Team Up For Kids) and Youth of the Year Award programs.
- 3. Provided \$3,750.00 in school supplies funds to three Title I Schools in Chesapeake.
- 4. Provided \$6,090.00 in mini-grants to support mentoring programs and initiatives serving Chesapeake youth.


With your help, the Foundation's distribution of \$189,000.00 has impacted the lives of many youth in Chesapeake by helping them reduce the cost of their education, and providing role models, schools supplies to needy students, guidance, information, leadership, and supporting mentoring programs. Mentoring grants have been provided to Ground Zero Development, Chesapeake's Juvenile Service Education Program, Chesapeake School for Success, and the Chesapeake Unit of the Boys and Girl Club. In 2016, The Foundation, in partnership with Chesapeake Public Schools, initiated the Dr. Darnell Johnson Middle School Distinguished Scholar program to recognize the success of middle school students.

Also, the Foundation in cooperation with the New Chesapeake Men for Progress, sponsored three Youth Development Conferences, and two Parent Education Summits at Indian River High School which served over 300 students and 75 parents, and supported its Black History Month Program

In 2012, the Foundation sponsored its first Student Merit Award Program which recognized the academic achievement and community service of students from Indian River, Western Branch, Deep Creek, and Hickory high schools.

In 2019, the Foundation established the Dr. William E. Ward Family Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000.00 to be awarded to a student attending a Historical Black College/University (HBCU). The Foundation also established a Vocational Trade & Technology and Fine Arts scholarships in the amount of \$500.00 each. The first Vocational Trade & Technology Scholarship was awarded in 2020. The Board of Directors is striving to not only serve more students with scholarship support, and is also striving to increase the amount of each scholarship as resources increase, support various mentoring initiatives, continue its commitment to supporting its adopted Title I schools student supply program. In 2022, The Foundation, in partnership with Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority, established a \$1,000.00 scholarship for students living in public housing and private housing supported by Housing Choice Vouchers.

In 2022, at the bequest of Carolyn Abron-McFadden, widow of George W. McCadden, Sr., The Foundation established the George W. McCadden, Sir Vocational and Technology Scholarship. The scholarship is to honor George W. McCadden, Sr. contributions and legacy



as an educator, award winning General Contractor, and mentoring young men and women to become entrepreneurs. His company started in 1963 as G. and V. Masonry in 1962, and evolved into G. and V. General Contractor, and many of his buildings such as churches, residential housings occupy the landscape in Hampton Roads His company was recognized in 1984 as the Small Business of the year by the Small Business Administration. The \$1,000.00 scholarship will be awarded annually to a deserving and qualified student pursuing a career in the vocational trades and technology occupations.
