Al Alexander CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

Welcome to the fifteenth edition of the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation, Inc. Chairman's Annual Report. I am honored to have been elected to serve as the second chairman of this prestigious organization and will always remember our chairman emeritus who passed away, Dr. William E. Ward.

During the past fifteen years, the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation has recognized over two hundred thirty-one graduates from the City of Chesapeake's seven high schools. The students were awarded \$197,000.00 in scholarships. All of these youths are either currently enrolled in, or are graduates of, colleges and universities throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia and across the country.

The New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation Inc. is a 501(3) (C) charitable organization. It was established January 21, 2010 as the philanthropic arm of the New Chesapeake Men for Progress. The mission of the foundation is to provide scholarships, grants, and mentoring services to the youth in the City of Chesapeake. The Foundation could not exist without your continued financial, physical and spiritual support.

As chairman, I am pleased to report that the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation continued to experience strong financial growth this fiscal year due to responsibly implementing creative ideas. The success of our organization relies upon a combination of providing exceptional customer service by sixty dedicated members and also by continuing to nurture strong relationships with our sponsors, vendors, and other stakeholders.

We have a number of accomplishments to celebrate this year such as improving our communication with stakeholders. We increased the funds to the three Title I schools (Carver Intermediate, Marshall Elementary, and Truitt Intermediate) and The Center for Student Success for additional school supplies. To date, the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation provided \$2,000 in school supplies funds to three Title I Schools in Chesapeake. A third accomplishment was to expand the number of scholarships given out this year to twenty-nine scholarships including ONE Chesapeake Public Schools graduating senior (with a 2.7 GPA or higher who wishes to attend a historically black college or university) to receive a five-hundred-dollar scholarship with matching funds from the Dr. William E. Ward estate (one thousand dollars total). We expanded the scholarships given out this year (one thousand dollars) to include a student who was seeking to go into a trade and in the Arts. Moreover, we continued our partnership with the Chesapeake Education Association to develop an ongoing \$1000

joint scholarship for students going into the educational profession. We recognize students who have excelled and are looking to further their education through college. But, there are various types of education. I would like to see ALL Chesapeake graduating students (with emphasis on the Chesapeake Career Center and the Governor's School) apply for this one scholarship

The New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation held its Sixth Annual Signature Black Tie Gala and its Fifteenth Annual Scholarship Breakfast. We reinstituted honoring Chesapeake Middle School students (10 students) this year. We must partner with other organizations such as Ground Zero Youth Development, the Chesapeake Unit of THE BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB, the Commonwealth Challenge, sorority/fraternities, and other organizations to mentor students and financially support them. To date, the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation provided \$5,000 in mini-grants to support mentoring programs and initiatives serving Chesapeake youth.

For the 2024 fiscal year, I would like the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation to continue being the premier 501(3)(c) in the Hampton Roads area. I would like to increase our membership by five percent. I would also like to partner with other organization(s) to expand our mentoring capabilities. I am imploring you to join me and the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation in the continuous investment in the youth of Chesapeake. It is our responsibility to seek out and mentor the leaders of tomorrow.

Chairman's Report:

As Chairman of the Board of the New Chesapeake Men for Progress Education Foundation, Inc., I am pleased to present the Board of Directors' report for 2023 on behalf of the Board. The Foundation experienced a very successful program year. The Board sponsored its Black Male Achievement and Scholarship Breakfast in which more than 600 people attended and witness the awarding of 21 scholarships to Black males graduating from Chesapeake's seven high Schools; sponsored it Annual Sponsors and Members Reception and awarded six named scholarships; launched the Foundation's Leadership Development Mentoring Program; supported three Title I Schools in Chesapeake with school supplies grants; provided educational and mentoring grants to Chesapeake Center for Student Success, Ground Zero Development, Inc., and Chesapeake Unit of the Boys and Girl Club.

The Foundation is proud of its designation as a "Proud Partner" of Chesapeake Public Schools, and its scholarship partnerships with Dr. Rose Marie Ward; Ian Thomas, Carolyn McCadden; Chesapeake Education Association, Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority; and Board member Micah C. Hall. Through these partnerships the Foundation is able to provide the following Scholarships:

- Dr. William E. Ward Family Scholarship for students attending Historical Black Colleges and Universities;
- Ian Thomas InterCooler Vocational Trades and Technology Scholarship.
- •George W. McCadden Vocational Trades and Technology Scholarship.
- NCMPEF/Chesapeake Education Association Teacher Education Scholarship.
- Fine Arts Scholarship.
- •NCMPEF/Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority Scholarship for student living in public housing and whose parents use housing choice vouchers.

The Foundation Board of Directors is very grateful for Micah and Kandi Hall for entrusting us to administer their \$12,000.00 Endowed Fund. These funds are dedicated solely for the purposes of enabling and assisting Chesapeake's youth by providing financial awards for student needs who reside in the Camelot and South Norfolk communities of Chesapeake.

Dr. Darnell Johnson's Award for Educational Excellence in Middle School

The late Dr. Darnell Johnson was the epitome of academic and leadership excellence. He was an Endowed and Distinguished professor at Elizabeth City State University, and master mentor of youth and adults. He was an avid researcher, author, educational leader, and focused on middle schools students as a pivotal point to change the trajectory of middle school student's educational success. As vice president of the Foundation, he stressed support for middle school students, and initiated the Middle School Educational Excellence Award initiative within the Foundation.

The Dr. Darnell Johnson's Award for Educational Excellence in Middle School recognizes student's academic success in the classroom. This award is given one middle school Black male from the seven middle schools in Chesapeake. The award recognizes each student with a high academic average in challenging classes and high scores on national standardized tests. It is also based on high motivation, initiative, integrity, intellectual depth, leadership qualities, solid attendance record, and exceptional judgement. The student must have shown tremendous growth, demonstrated unusual commitment to learning in academics despite various obstacles, and improved grades to a superior level. The Awards are presented annually at the Foundation's Annual Black Male Achievement and Scholarship Breakfast. Each student is given a \$100.00 gift card and certificate of achievement. The initiative is fully funded by his widow, Dr. Stephanie D. B. Johnson.



Educational Partnerships:

The Board of Directors and members are proud of the partnerships it has developed and is grateful for its designation as a "Proud Partner" with Chesapeake Public Schools. These collaborative partnerships with individuals and organizations share common goals with the Foundation and are mutually beneficial to all parties. Collaborative partnerships are listed below:

1. **Dr. William E. Ward Family Scholarship**. Dr. Rose Marie Ward and the Foundation support this scholarship for students attending a Historical Black College or University.



NaSean Lee Smith, a graduate of Deep Creek High School was the 2023 recipient, and he is attending Shaw University. NaSean excelled academically, earning commendable Advanced Studies Diploma, captain of the basketball team and was honored with the "Best Teammate Award" for his sportsmanship, team motivation and

integrity.

2. Chesapeake Redevelopment and Housing Authority Scholarship is a joint effort to provide scholarship for students in public housing and whose parent use housing vouchers.



Cameron McLean was the 2023 recipient of the NCMFEF/CRHA Scholarship. Cameron, a graduate of Indian River High School, excelled academically and received standard diploma with a commendable designation. He excelled in athletics and was team captain of the basketball team where he encouraged and motivated his teammates to achieve their highest potential. He fearlessly participated in poetry contests, talent shows and even explored photojournalism.

3. **InterCooler Vocational Trades and Technology Scholarship** is fully funded by Ian Thomas and his minority owned Trucking Corporation.



Willy Carmello Detraya Naar, III pursuit of excellence in the field of HVAC began during his time at Oscar Smith High School and the Chesapeake Career Center HVAC program. He showed remarkable work ethics and aptitude for the subject matter, culminating in his achievement of the EPA Universal Certification. This certification showcases his comprehensive understanding of HVAC systems and materials. He is interning with Comfort Systems of Virginia, a renowned company in the industry. He is an emerging talent in the HVAC field

4. The George W. McCadden, Sr. Vocational Trades and Technology Scholarship was established in 2023, by his widow, Carolyn Abron-McCadden, to assist students pursuing

careers in the vocational trades and technology. The Scholarship is fully funded by Carolyn Abron-McCadden, ant the first scholarship was awarded in August of 2023.



Eric Jalen Pope was recipient of the first George W. McCadden Sr., Vocational Trades and Technology Scholarship. He is a motivated and accomplished individual and graduated with honors from Grassfield High School, the Chesapeake Career Center as s well as taking courses at Tidewater Community College. As a student with EPA Universal Certification, he has a thorough understanding of heating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems. Eric is continuing his studies at Tidewater Community College.

5. NCMPEF Fine Arts Scholarship was established in 2020 for students pursuing careers in



fine arts careers. Jarius Immanuel Hines was recipient of the 2023 scholarship. Jarius is a talented and accomplished individual known for his passion and dedication to the performing arts. He is a graduate from Deep Creek High School and a member of the prestigious National Honor Society. He exemplifies the values of leadership, scholarship, and service. He is attending James Madison University pursuing a major in music and the performing arts.

6. Chesapeake Education Association and the NCMPEF Teacher Education Scholarship was established in 2020 for students pursuing careers in teacher education. There were no applicants in 023.


